The Presenter



Gloria Maccow, Ph.D.

is an Assessment Training Consultant with Pearson. She was trained as a school psychologist at Texas A&M University and at the University of Florida. She worked for two years as Supervisor of Psychological Services and for several years as a school psychologist with Guilford County Schools in North Carolina. She provided training for Graduate students in school psychology at Indiana State University and at Illinois State University, and she worked as a psychologist in private practice in Greensboro, NC.

Presentation

This full-day workshop on the Millon Clinical Inventories will provide a basic overview of the structural characteristics of the MCM-III, the MACI, and the M-PACI. The presenter will describe the scales, including the Grossman Facet Scales, and the 2008 norms. Information will be provided on administration and scoring and case examples will be used to illustrate interpretation. Applications of the inventories in different settings will also be discussed.

Objectives

Participants will be able to:

- Describe the structure of the Millon Clinical Multiaxial Inventory-III (MCM-III) .
- Describe the guiding theoretical system of the Millon Adolescent Clinical Inventory (MACI) and the Millon Pre-Adolescent Clinical Inventory (M-PACI).
- Describe the scales of the MCM-III, MACI, and M-PACI.
- Describe administration of the MCM-III, MACI, and M-PACI.
- Describe scoring of the MCM-III, MACI, and M-PACI.
- Interpret Result of the MCM-III, MACI, and M-PACI.

Lunch Session Speaker



James Loving, Psy.D

is a clinical and forensic psychologist whose career has focused on practicing and training psychological assessment, with a particular interest in child and family issues ranging from juvenile delinquency to adoption. In addition to teaching Rorschach assessment at the Institute for Graduate Clinical Psychology, Dr. Loving has overseen research involving the Rorschach and other tests.

Lunch Session

For a number of reasons unfolding since the death of John Exner, the Rorschach Comprehensive System (CS) will not continue to evolve into the future. A team of psychologists who have been active contributors to the research and development of the CS are now finalizing a new system, the Rorschach Performance Assessment System (RPAS), which will soon be made available to clinicians. The RPAS will build on the CS's existing literature and empirical strengths, while introducing many new features that are intended to simultaneously strengthen yet streamline the CS. This will include notable advancements in terms of administration, coding, and interpretation. The current presentation will introduce the audience to the circumstances that have necessitated the development of a new system, and then will highlight the basic concepts and advancements that are driving the development of the RPAS. Also included will be a discussion of the current state of the Rorschach and the implications of introducing a new system at this time.

Objectives

- Identify the circumstances that have prevented the continuation of Exner's Comprehensive System and the development of a new Rorschach system.
- Identify core components (in terms of administration, coding, and interpretation, and computer assistance) that will be included in the RPAS.
